Beware of NON-OFFICIAL Websites and Agencies for K-ETA

- The Government of the Republic of Korea has implemented the Korea Electronic Travel Authorization (K-ETA) from September 1st, 2021.
- Recently, some non-official K-ETA application websites were found to be illegally collecting a higher fee than the official fee and relevant damage cases have been reported. Please be careful to protect yourself from damages due to fraudulent non-official K-ETA websites and agencies.

Ministry of Justice

- Kindly note that the Government of the Republic of Korea has not designated any agency for K-ETA application.
- Please make sure to apply through the K-ETA official website (www.k-eta.go.kr) or mobile app (K-ETA).
- Please be extra cautious to avoid any financial damages or frauds due to non-official application agencies.



Information for K-ETA

- Items to prepare for K-ETA application
- 1. Valid passport
- 2. Valid e-mail address
- 3. Face image photo
- ** For PC, image file. For mobile application, photo taken by mobile device camera during application.
- 4. Credit or debit card that can be used to pay the fee. The fee is 10,000KRW (approximately USD \$9~10) per person.

If you have any further questions FAO click.

- K-ETA(Korea Electronic Travel Authorization) Announcements
- K-ETA eligible nationals, who wish to enter visa-free the Republic of Korea, must obtain K-ETA approval before boarding the flight or ship. Please keep in mind that the assessment can take more than 72 hours depending of the situation (ex, an increased number of K-ETA applications, applicants' circumstances, etc). Therefore, please apply for K-ETA with sufficient time.
- The validity period of a K-ETA is 2 years from the date of approval. K-ETA approval does not guarantee entry to the Republic of Korea. The final determination of a traveler's entry will be made by the immigration official during entry immigration inspection.
- 3. K-ETA approval may be denied or cancelled in any case of submitting false or inaccurate information on the K-ETA application, and that person may be subject to penalties or entry restriction according to relevant Korean laws. The same will be applied to those who are applying on behalf of the applicant.



- Even if your K-ETA has not expired, you are required to apply for a new K-ETA
 if there are any changes to your information, such as name, sex, date of birth,
 nationality, passport information (passport number, passport expiration date),
 infectious disease or criminal record.
- 6. If there are any changes to your purpose of entry, address in Korea or contact information after your K-ETA approval, you are required to update such information through the K-ETA website (K-ETA application results Edit Information) before entering Korea. Failure to do so may result in unfavorable measures such as entry denial.
- Those with K-ETA approval can go through entry immigration more conveniently, as they will be exempted from submitting the arrival card upon entry.
- 8. K-ETA application by proxy is available, and one person can apply for up to a total of 30 people and make the payment at once.
- K-ETA Application Fee Guide
- 1. The fee is 10,000 KRW per person.
- 2. When paying the K-ETA fee, additional fees for online payment may apply.
- 3. The K-ETA application fee is non-refundable once payment is made, regardless of the result of the application.
- 4. If the overseas payment is blocked for your card, you may not be able to pay properly. Please contact your card company for detailed information.



How to fill up the K-ETA form

First of all, be sure to go to the right website. There are many fake keta websites that appeared recently. And they can be higher in search if you just enter "Keta Korea" in the search engine. The ONLY correct website for applying for Keta is

the one of Korean government:

https://www.k-eta.go.kr/

In the photo you can see what its main page looks

Any site with a similar but other address is fake. Also please note that the price for K-ETA is 10.000 Korean won (krw). If you are asked to pay more or pay in any other currency, you must be on a fake site.

You can also download the K-ETA application on your phone. It's easier to work with, especially when it comes to uploading photos, as they have to be of the right size and weight. Application does the resizing job automatically.

Go to Apply for K-ETA to fill out the form. Check K-ETA Results can be used to check the status of your application.



Now they want you to upload the photo of your passport. Only the page with your photo and all the personal info. Not the first two front pages as sometimes is required for the visa application. Just look at the example on the site.

When you upload the photo of the front page of your passport, it should be less than 300 kb. You can check the size of your photo by clicking on the info icon below the photo on iPhone or on the photo itself sometimes on other devices. When you upload the photo, sometimes your phone may give you options of the size you want to upload (Actual size, Medium, Large, etc). So choose the appropriate one. Otherwise you have to resize the photo in another program, like a

photo editor. You can find them on your phone or computer, usually they are preinstalled. Otherwise there are plenty of free online photo editors. If your photo is not the right size, the



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




Next part is the most tricky. Put in the address in Korea Please put in Musangsa address.

Here's how to do it:


Press the button - Find Postal Code







This should be the address you enter anywhere else, when you are asked to provide you address in Korea. For example, if you need to fill out the immigration card upon arrival.



Next is the photo. On the site you will see examples of the photos that are not correct and the ones that are appropriate. Study it well. Basically, it's better to use the photo from your passport or driving license, etc.

Don't take any strange photos, or you can be rejected.

You will have to adjust the size of your photo to the site requirements:

less than 700*700 pixels, lower than 100 kb, only JPG or JPEG, facing front.


If your photo is of the wrong size, the site will not accept it.

You can do the adjustments with the photo editor or while uploading the photo your phone might ask you if you want to upload the actual size or smaller (Iphone does).

If you can't resize your photo in the proper way, just download the **K-ETA App** and take a selfie from it. It will be sized automatically.



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
Next question is if you are traveling with somebody. You can say NO, then you don't have to do anything else. If you are traveling with somebody, you can say Yes. Then you will have to provide this person's details. If you are traveling with a group of people, you will have to provide the details of all of them.

Note that these people will still have to fill out the K_ETA form themselves, too.

I have put a **Group Tour** as a **Relation**, but you can choose another option, more appropriate to

your case

You can add more people by clicking the button below (can't see in this photo, sorry).





Also on this page you can **add** more people. This means you can fill out the K-ETA form for somebody else, too. And pay for them and yourself later. You can add up to 30 people.

After you have checked and corrected all your information, added more people, if necessary and filled everything once again for them, you can proceed to the payment.

Remember, payment is 10.000 KRW per person. If you are asked to pay more, you are on the wrong site.



Happy October! Here is some additional information that we hope people will find helpful in preparing for their trip.

Delayed and Cancelled Flights

There will be volunteers waiting at the airport to greet participants as they arrive. Because we have the flight information of each person, we can adjust for delays. However, should someone miss their connecting flight or have their flight cancelled, please contact your Regional Coordinator or us directly at: office@musangsa.org, This way, we can adjust to the changed schedule.

Please note that those arriving in Korea <u>before Oct.</u> 8th should arrange to register for the Conference at the Golden Tulip Incheon Airport Hotel between the hours of 9am – 6pm.

Laundry

Most people will be traveling for almost two weeks on the Dharma Tour. Laundry facilities available at the Musangsa from 9-12th. Oct. 16-17th, the group will sleep at the Delpino Resort, which has coin laundry facilities. From the 18th onward, the group will stay at the PRESIDENT Hotel in Seoul, which has a paid laundry service.

The good news is that for most places on the tour, the group will sleep in the same room. This means it is possible to do some small laundry by hand and hang it up to dry overnight and during following day. To do this, it will be necessary to bring some portable laundry soap and, for those interested, a portable laundry line. Another drying option is to use the Korean ondol floor. Koreans usually use floor heating and laundry spread out on the heated floor dries very quickly. This is what the locals do for most of the year.

Earplugs and Noseguards

Unless you have upgraded and arranged to have a private room, participants will share a room with one or more people during the tour. Please note that in some places there will be 4 or more people to a large room. We would like to suggest that light sleepers bring earplugs. Also, if you know yourself to be someone who sometimes snores, we ask that you bring noseguards with you on the tour as a courtesy to your roommates.

Wifi at KCC

There have been some questions about the wifi access at KCC. There is limited wifi access in the rooms at KCC, but open access in most public areas. Should you need unlimited internet access in your room, bring a landline cable. Each room has a landline internet connection.

Thank you for joining the Whole World is a Single Flower 2023 in Korea!

The WWSF 2023 Committee and volunteers in Korea are very excited that the Conference and tour date is coming close and we are looking forward to welcoming you in October. Here is some basic information that will initially help prepare for your trip.

October 8th: Arrival Day

WWSF volunteers will be waiting at the airport to greet you upon arrival between 7:00am to 10pm. Please look for the WWSF logo or Sunims. Group transportation to the hotel is pre-arranged according to arrival times, so please follow the volunteers who will chaperone the groups or individuals. Should you arrive at a date or time other than that provided to the WWSF communications director or your Regional Coordinator, please note that it is possible volunteers may not be available to chaperone you. WWSF volunteer-assisted airport-to-hotel transport is as follows:

For individuals* - FREE SHUTTLE BUS is available everyday 1 Hour intervals

Meals

Meals provided during the WWSF tour will be vegetarian. Most meals will be Korean fare, and please be aware that some Korean dishes can be spicy. Each hotel on the tour will provide a breakfast buffet that includes "Western-style" food (bread, eggs, etc.).

Oct 8th: Due to flight arrival times ranging from 6:30 am until 9:50 pm, participants are asked to be responsible for their own meals for that day:

- The Golden Tulip Incheon Airport Hotel has a restaurant.
- A five-minute walk from the hotel will bring you to "Lotte Mart," a multileveled grocery/shopping center, which has a food court in the basement.
- Nearby the hotel are a variety of options: a15-20minute walk down the street from the hotel is a restaurant and shopping area that has options for the more, or even the less adventurous. Many of the shops and restaurants in this area have their signs or menus in English, so it is tourist friendly.
 WWSF volunteers will be available to assist participants in finding these areas.

General Amenities

Most hotels provide general toiletries including toothpaste, soap, shampoo and towels.

As an environmental campaign, some hotels do not provide disposable items such as toothpaste, toothbrush, soap and shampoo etc.

Medical Emergencies

In a medical emergency, Tel: 119. The caller's location is automatically detected. Emergency responses are rapid; ambulances are quickly dispatched to take people to a hospital. When a foreigner makes a 119 call they are directed to a translator from the Korea National Tourist Organization via a three-way call; this allows a foreigner to clearly communicate their situation and needs. Available languages include English, Japanese and Chinese. Ambulance services are provided free of charge.

There is an emergency medical information center which is available 24 hours a day by dialing 1339. English-speaking doctors are available to provide medical information in an emergency, as well as advice on finding an open pharmacy (yakguk), some of which are open 24 hours a day, or hospital. To reach this service from a mobile telephone or from outside Seoul, **Tel: 02 1339.**

Dress Code

For the general tour:

Comfortable regular clothes for travel and meditation pants and working jackets are also acceptable for visiting temples. As most temples are located in mountain areas, bring comfortable outdoor walking or light hiking shoes, and if needed a walking stick.

At the Delpino Resort on the East Sea, there are hot bath facilities. Should you want to take advantage of these facilities, you will need a bathing suit. https://www.sonohotelsresorts.com/main.index.dp/dmparse.dm

For the two-day WWSF Conference at the Korean Culture Center

For the Conference, we encourage you to bring a set of nice clothes and shoes, or a nice bowing robe. The Conference, being a significant event for Korean Buddhists as well, will be a chance for us to represent Zen Master Seung Sahn and the Kwan Um School of Zen to the Korean Buddhist community and general public. Sunims are requested to wear a Jangsams and kasa during the opening/closing ceremonies. *For visiting temples, please bring durumagi*.

► Practice at Musangsa

During practice at Musangsa, Jangsams, bowing robes, five precepts Kasas and ceremonial Kasas can be worn.



General Etiquette

► In Temples:

During the tour we will visit several traditional temples, and as various Zen centers and temples differ in some aspects, below are basic Korean temple etiquette to keep in mind:

- · Dress in appropriate clothing, including socks, sleeved top and bottoms below the knees.
- · When entering the temple grounds or Buddha halls, be aware not to talk or laugh too loudly.
- · No nose-blowing in Buddha or meditation halls.
- · Whenever you see a Sunim, bow in hapjang
- · No smoking or drinking alcohol within temple grounds.
- · Do not sit with feet facing the altar, a teacher or a Sunim.

On Tour in Korea

- · Please be considerate; gather on time during the trip to avoid delays for the group.
- · In Korean culture, nose-blowing in public places like restaurants is considered impolite.
- · Use both hands whenever giving or taking things from others.
- · When hailing a taxi, stick out your hand with palm down.
- · Alcohol and smoking are not allowed on the tour buses.

► Wifi and Phone

- · 3/4/5-G mobile with roaming is available in Korea. All hotels on the WWSF tour provide free Wi-Fi, except for Korean Cultural Center where Wi-Fi is limited. Generally, Wi-Fi is available in most public places.
- · Mobile phone rental is available at the airport. Online reservations are available through each provider's website, but reservations are not required. http://english.visitkorea.or.kr/enu/RE/RE_EN_1_2_4_1.jsp
- · Buying a SIM card to use for your current mobile phone is easy and can be done in several places at the Incheon airport: SIM Card Dealers at ICN: Arrivals & Departures Areas
- SIM Cards can be purchased before arrival through websites like this one: https://www.krsim.net/product/Korea-SIM-Gold-4G-LTE-Unlimited-Data-Only-USIM/44/
- · International calls can be done over the internet, either through an app like Skype, or via computer.

· Once you exit customs at Incheon airport, currency exchange counters are open from 6:00 - 21:00. The airport, all hotels on the WWSF tour, and most convenience stores and rest stops have ATM/Cash machines for cash withdrawal in KRW.

► International Credit Card

large banks; these ATMs will usually have an English language option.

You can use your Visa or Mastercard and travel money card almost everywhere in South Korea. While you can use debit cards to make purchases, not all ATMs accept foreign cards. Always look for the word Global on ATMs before you use it.

Mobile payments are wildly popular with youth in South Korea. So, load your credit cards onto your smartphones and leave your credit cards back at the hotel when you go out in big cities. That said, always carry a bit of cash on you for tips or smaller restaurants and street food.

Currency

The monetary unit of Korea is Won (KRW). Korean currency consists of 10, 50, 100 and 500 won coins, and 1,000, 5,000, 10,000 and 50,000 won notes. KRW 1,200 is close to USD 1. Most bank offices you find on the street offer currency exchange.

Tax & Tip

A Value-Added Tax (VAT) is levied on most goods and services at a standard rate of 10% and is usually included in the retail price.

Tipping in South Korea isn't customary, and is therefore not expected or an obligation. In fact, it is not uncommon for staff to politely refuse a tip if the establishment doesn't accept gratuity. You won't offend someone by not tipping, but there are times when a small token of appreciation is welcome, such as in Western-in-fluenced businesses or when hotel services are exemplary.

HSBC Premier also allows for cash withdrawal.

T-money system is the convenient cash top-up system that can be used in Korea to pay for public transportation, taxis and for cash use, and is accepted in most convenient stores around the country: http://eng.t-money.co.kr/

It is recommended that some petty cash be kept on hand at all times. Credit/debit cards are not accepted in some remote small local shops.

Voltage/Sockets/Plug

The standard voltage in Korea is 220 volts. The outlet has two round holes and is the same type used in France, Germany, Austria and many EU countries.

A multi-voltage travel adapter can be bought at Incheon airport, if not purchased in your home country.

Hwagyesa

This is where Zen Master Seung Sahn established his first international Zen Center in Korea and is where Zen Master Ko Bong and Zen Master Seung Sahn spent the last part of their lives. The building where Zen Master Seung Sahn lived will be visited on the tour.

October 9th to 13th

Musangsa

Musangsa is the head temple of the Kwan Um Zen School in Asia and the only Kwan Um Zen School temple in Korea. It was established by Zen Master Seung Sahn to encourage the growth and independence of the KUZS at the place of its root. It is home to the largest community of international monastics in Korea, KUSZ.

Before Musangsa was built, many Kwan Um School of Zen practitioners practiced for three months retreat at ShinWon-Sa International Zen Center.

Magoksa is where Zen Master Seung Sahn first became a monk.

Hwagyesa

Hwagyesa Field of Flowers Temple







Established in 1522, during the Choson Dynasty, Hwagyesa is located in Northern Seoul. It is a temple known for its connection to Zen Master Ko Bong and Zen Master Seung Sahn. It is also quite renowned for supporting people from all over the world to practice Korean Zen Buddhism.

It was after the Korean War that Zen Master Seung Sahn became abbot of the temple and brought his teacher, Zen Master Ko Bong, there to live with him. At that time, his teacher was quite ill and Zen Master Seung Sahn looked after him until he passed away in 1961. Soon after, Zen Master Seung Sahn left Hwa Gye Sa to establish a small temple in Tokyo. Then, in 1971, he went to teach in the United States. He later returned to Hwa Gye Sa, however, to establish the Seoul International Zen Center, which opened its meditation room in 1991. There, he taught Zen until his passing in 2004.

Hwagyesa has been the home of many people from around the world who have come to Korea to deepen their experience in Zen practice. Not only does the Seoul International Zen Center continue to hold regular practice and retreats, but Hwa Gye Sa is now the home of the Training Center for International Haengjas—a place where non-Korean postulants, who wish to ordain as monastics in the Korean tradition, go to train while studying Korean language.



Donghaksa



Located in the east valley of Gyeryongsan Mountain in Hakbong-ri, Banpo-myeon, Gongju, Donghaksa Temple is the first and the oldest existing academic institute for female monks. Home to about 150 monks who study and practice Buddhism, the temple is the most visited spot on all of Gyerongsan Mountain due to its history, convenient location, and visitor facilities. The elegant structure of the temple is heighted by the majestic view of Munpilbong Peak to its front. In the spring, many visitors come to the temple to see the cherry blossom tunnel, a 3 kilometer pathway from Bakjeongja three- way intersection to Donghaksa Temple. Every year since 1993 the temple has also been the venue of the Donghaksa Spring Flower Festival



Gapsa Temple

Gapsa Temple is located in Gyeryongsan National Park in Gongju, Chungcheongnam-do. Gapsa Temple is the most important temple in the Gyeryongsan National Park area. Originally, the temple was known as Gyeronggapsa Temple, which means "Rooster Dragon Foremost Temple," in English. The temple was then called Gyeryongsa-sa in the early Joseon Dynasty (1392-1910). The first "sa" in the name meant "fundamental," so the temple was called "Rooster Dragon Fundamental Temple," in English. It was at the end of the 18th century that the name of the temple changed once more to Gyeryongsan Gapsa. Now the temple is known as Gapsa Temple, which simply means "Foremost Temple," in English.



Gapsa Temple, according to Goryeo
Dynasty (918-1392) records, was first
established in 420 A.D. by the legendary
missionary monk Ado -hwasang of the
Goguryeo Kingdom (37 B.C. – 668 A.D.).
According to the Samguk Yusa
(Memorabilia of the Three Kingdoms), Ado
-hwasang was travelling near the edge of

a mountain during the evening when he saw a beam of light covering half of the mountain, which appeared all the way up to Yeoncheon-bong Peak. When he climbed to the top of the mountain, and past the Yongmun Pokpo (Dragon Gate Waterfall), Ado-hwasang discovered that the light was emanating from an enormous natural rock pagoda called "Cheonjin-botap," in Korean, or "Heavenly Truth Treasure Pagoda," in English. According to the same legend from the Samguk Yusa, the pagoda had been built six hundred years prior to its discovery by Ado-hwasang by Jiguk Cheonwang (The Eastern King of the Four Heavenly Kings, the Sacheonwang). The pagoda had been constructed to house the Buddha's sari (crystallized remains). Jiguk Cheonwang had constructed the natural rock pagoda under the order of Indian Emperor Ashoka. The mountain had been chosen as an auspicious site in the northeastern corner of the human world.

ShinWon-Sa

Sinwonsa Temple is located in Gongju, Chungcheongnam - do. More specifically, Sinwonsa Temple is one of three major temples located in Gyeryongsan National Park alongside Donghaksa Temple and Gapsa Temple. Sinwonsa Temple is situated in the western part of the park. Sinwonsa Temple was first established in 651 A.D. by the monk Bodeok - hwasang, who was also the founder of Yeolban - jong (The Nirvana Sect).



Eventually, the temple was left in disrepair and eventually rebuilt byDoseon-guksa (82 6-898 A.D.) at the end of Unified Silla (668 935 A.D.). The temple was later rebuilt in 1298; and then again in 1393 by the monk Muhak-daesa (1327 - 1405).

After this rebuild, the temple was destroyed in 1592 during the Imjin War (1592 - 1598). The temple was later rebuilt and moved slightly to the northwest from its former location. Eventually, the temple would be renovated in 1876 led by the monk Gaeyeon-hwasang. And in 1885, the temple was repaired and renovated, once more, this time by Sim Sanghun, who was a government official. He did this to help quell any troubles the country was going through. Interestingly, it was also at this time that Sim Sanghun changed the Chinese characters of the temple name. Originally, Sinwonsa Temple meant "Spirit Garden Temple" in English. It was changed at this time to mean "New Era Temple" in English, instead. Before Musangsa was built, many KwaneUm School of Zen practitioners practiced for three months retreat at Shinwonsa International Zen Center.



Magoksa


Magoksa Hemp Valley Temple

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Magoksa has two founding stories that date the temple back to either the 7th or the 8th century. During the late 19th and 21st centuries, both Zen Masters Kyongho and Mangong taught here at various times. It was also here that Zen Master Seung Sahn was ordained in October of 1948. After ordination, Zen Master Seung Sahn went immediately to the nearby Buyoung Hermitage to begin his intensive 100 day solo retreat, where he had his first enlightenment experience. When he returned down from the mountain to Magoksa, Zen Master Seung Sahn met his teacher, Zen Master Ko Bong-a disciple and successor to Zen Master Mangong. Zen Master Kobong had a reputation for being both brilliant and unorthodox. Even more than his teacher, Zen Master Mangong focused his energy on teaching nuns and lay practitioners. A year after their meeting, in January of 1950, Zen Master Seung Zen Master Kobong.



When Zen Master Seung Sahn was a young monk, his job was housemaster at Magoksa. He was responsible for overseeing the kitchen supplies and the general living affairs of the temple. Once, in preparation for a big ceremony, the monks spent days making tofu, which is stored in large tubs under water to keep from spoiling. In the days before the ceremony, one monk noticed that every morning two blocks of tofu were missing. This was strange because the storage room was locked and there was no evidence of forced entry. Zen Master Seung Sahn decided to hide one night in the storage room and see for himself what was happening. Around midnight, something like a shadow came from the corner and moved to the tub. It was a cat. The cat



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Descriptions of the WWSF Facilities at Musangsa and The Conference Center

1. Musangsa

The Musangsa facility is built in the traditional Korean style. There are five separate Spirit Halls and the Office. Shoes must be removed when entering any of the buildings. Socks must be worn in all buildings. If you must wear some kind of footwear inside the buildings because of health issues, please let us know in advance. Currently, there aren't any chairs at the entrance of the buildings, where shoes are taken off. There are not many chairs in Musangsa. We plan to arrange more chairs for the WWSF. Please let us know if you need to sit on a chair for meals or meditation.

Sleeping areas

Everyone sleeps on mattresses on the floor. There are no Western-style sleeping beds in Musangsa. If you require to sleep in a bed, let us know in advance. If so then you might stay in a hotel nearby.

◆ Yosache (Dormitory)

There are sleeping areas on the second and third floors. The second floor is for women, the third floor for men. There are quite a few steps with handrails between floors. The kitchen and dining hall are on the 1st floor.

♦ Office 1st floor

The sleeping area in the office building is on the ground floor. However, walking from the office to the other buildings involves a little walk uphill. Like all places in the temple, sleeping in the office is on a mattress on the floor.

Hotel

Near Musangsa there are various hotels where people can stay for greater comfort. The hotels are 10-40 minutes away from Musangsa. A pick-up service will be available.

◆ Practicing Area

- Buddha Hall: There is a steep hill with a paved road going up to the Buddha Hall. If you need, we can take you up and down by car.
- Meditation Hall: The Meditation Hall is a two-story building with stairs which has a handrail. The Meditation Room is on the 2nd floor. The first floor has private rooms for senior Sunims and visiting teachers.

◆ Suggestions

It is best to wear slip-on outdoor shoes in Korean temples as you will have to remove your shoes on entering most buildings.

The walk up and down to the Buddha Hall is longer and more difficult but as mentioned earlier, those who have difficulty walking uphill can go up by car. Since there are no western style high beds and some places have steps or elevated areas to get to, we suggest that during the time the conference is at Musangsa, people with difficulties stay at a hotel nearby that might fit their needs better and be more comfortable for them.



2. Conference Center

There are some rooms with mattresses on slightly raised beds, but it is not a full western style bed.

Most of the other rooms at the conference venue do not have beds and are traditional Korean rooms where you sleep on a mattress on the floor.

The sleeping rooms are on the 1st and 2nd floors. There are a few steps with handrails between floors. For those who have difficulty going upstairs, we can reserve a room for you on the 1st floor.

To get from the sleeping and conference rooms to the restaurant you must use the stairs. There is a handrail for the stairs.

The conference venue is mostly flat, but there is quite a walk between the sleeping rooms, conference room, and dining room.

For those who might need assistance during the night, we suggest you share a room with someone who can help you if it is needed (such as getting up from a low bed).

3. Post-conference trip

The trip is scheduled for about 3 days.

It is a tour mainly of temples, so you should keep in mind that chairs may not be available. There might be some walking to do, some of which might be in elevated areas. Entering certain buildings might include going up a few steps with no handrail.

We are sorry if there are some inconveniences. We wish to make your trip as comfortable as possible. Please let us know if there is any kind of help or situation requirements that you might have so we can arrange for that ahead of time.
